Carton Bird Feeder

What You'll Need: Empty quart sized cardboard milk carton, scissors, string or cord, hole punch or pencil, bird seed.

How to Make It: Cut a hole in the milk carton. It should be big enough so a bird could come and sit and eat the feed, but not too big or the carton will become unstable. Using a hole punch or a pencil, make a hole in the top of the milk carton and put a string through the hole. Tie a knot in the string. Fill the carton with bird seed until it reaches the top of the hole. Hang the carton on a tree branch and watch the birds enjoy their snack!

Tips:

A quart size carton works perfectly, as it isn't too large and holds a decent amount of food. Check your bird feeder regularly and refill as needed.

Early Literacy Tip: Read stories with expression. Make it more interesting by talking as the characters would talk, making sound effects, and making expressions with your face and hands. When children enjoy being read to, they will grow to love books and be eager to learn to read them.
