help your child to roll out snakes and
mold them into letter shapes.

Making Cookies

I am making cookie dough,
(point to self)

Round and round the beaters go.
(move hands in a circle)

Add some flour from a cup,
(pretend to pour)

Stir and mix the batter up.
(pretend to stir)

Roll them, cut them, nice and neat,
(pretend to roll and cut)

Put them on a cookie sheet.
(hold out hands like a cookie sheet)

Bake them, count them, one, two, three,
(pretend to count cookies)

Then serve them to my friends for tea!
(pretend to pass cookies around)



- 1 cup peanut butter
- 1/2 cup honey
- 2 cups powdered sugar

Mix ingredients in a bowl and you’re done! Store in an airtight container or plastic baggie with air sucked out of the bag. (Quick tip: Spray your 1/2 cup with oil before measuring your honey and the honey will pour much easier.)

Early Literacy Tip: Point to familiar objects and name them. When a child hears an object called the same name over and over, he learns to connect the spoken word with its meaning. For example: “Here’s your blanket. Your very favorite blanket. What a nice, soft, blue blanket!”
